

Vintage RC Precision NDC Contest Feb 2012

Sunday 27 Feb 2012

For those recently joined members of the club and who may not have heard of NDC could I briefly tell you a bit about it. NDC is short for National Decentralised Competitions. Its run by Model Flying NZ so that those who are interested in taking part in some competition flying during the year can do so and have their results collated with other people nationally as a country wide competition. You fly the competitions that are pre scheduled by MFNZ and the results are sent to the recording officer who reports the results in the Model Flyers World. These appear near the back of the magazine each issue. The schedule of events is on the MFNZ website under competition.

This year the NDC has been altered so that instead of a competition having to be run on a set weekend it can be run on any weekend in the month. This makes life easier because we can pick which weekend we like and therefore can pick decent weather more easily..

On Sunday Feb 27 two of us flew a contest called Vintage RC Precision. We flew it pretty badly in fact but that's OK, we can only improve. This contest is for power planes from the vintage era which is defined by the design of the plane having to be before the 1st January 1951. The power can be IC or electric and there is no restriction on the power unit used. The aim with this competition is to do 3 flights of 3 minutes each exactly. One point per second in the air is scored but if you go over the 3 minutes one point per second over is deducted. So the maximum per flight is 180 points. In addition you can earn 20 points for landing within 10 metres of a pre determined spot and another 20 points for a ROG (rise off the ground) takeoff. So its pretty simple. Each flight is timed from takeoff and the motor run must not be greater than 1 minute..

Today Nigel Grace and I flew the contest. Nigel flew his Vic Smeed Tomboy, a 1950 design with, in this case, a replica Mills .75 diesel engine. I few my Ethereal Lady which was also designed by Vic Smeed but in 1947. It has a Mills 1.3 diesel up front. I did the 3 flights but had all sorts of problems getting the motor to run for a decent length of time resulting in 3 very poor flights. I did manage to land within the 10 metres a couple of times. My motor is 60 odd years old and they can be a bit tricky that's for sure. Nigel had a different set of problems. By the time he flew there was a bit of breeze appearing and his Tomboy took off down wind and ended up several hundred metres to the north east and took a fair walk to retrieve. Nigel had wondered why he had had difficulty controlling it, but understood why when he retrieved the errant machine that he hadn't turned the receiver on. This is something we have all done but the interesting thing is that his plane flew beautifully and landed itself without a scratch which goes to show that the Tomboy which was designed as a free flight model really does fly free flight very well ,despite not having been specifically tuned to do so in this case.

Nigel didn't bother with any more flights after this. It was good fun anyway.



The family members sat silent as they absorbed the news. After a great length of time, someone asked, "Well, how much does a brain cost?"


The doctor quickly responded, "\$5,000 for a male brain, and \$200 for a female brain."
